Gracie Allen (b. 1895, d. 1964)

American singer, actress, and comedian known for performing with her husband George Burns on radio, television, and film.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, CA

Christine Gossett Ames (b. 1912, d. 2005)

American actress, known for *Bluebird's Eighth Wife* (1938) and *Suez* (1938), wife of actor Leon Ames. Kidnapped with Ames in 1964, held hostage for \$50,000.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Leon Ames (b. 1902, d. 1993)

American actor known for *Meet Me in St. Louis* (1944) and *The Postman Always Rings Twice* (1946). Kidnapped with his wife Christine Gossett Ames in 1964, held hostage for \$50,000.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Marian Anderson (b. 1897, d. 1993)

American contralto, sang a range of music including opera and spirituals. First African American singer to perform at the Metropolitan Opera, active within the 1960s civil rights movement.

Buried at Eden Cemetery in Collingdale, PA

Susan B. Anthony (b. 1820, d. 1906)

Leading figure within the women's suffrage movement. Co-founder of the New York Women's State Temperance Society and the National American Woman Suffrage Association.

Buried at Mt Hope Cemetery in Rochester, NY

Marie Antoinette (b. 1755, d. 1793)

Last Queen of France before the abolishment of the monarchy during the French Revolution. Executed by guillotine age 37.

Buried at the Basilica of Saint-Denis in Paris, France

Harold Arlen (b. 1905, d. 1986)

American composer known for writing the songs in The Wizard of Oz film in 1939 including, *Over the Rainbow* (1939).

Buried at Ferncliff Cemetery in Hartsdale, NY

Fred Astaire (b. 1899, d. 1987)

American dancer, actor, singer, choreographer and television presenter, known for his roles in *Shall We Dance* (1937), *The Band Wagon* (1953), and *Funny Face* (1957).

Buried at Oakwood Memorial Park and Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Chet Atkins (b. 1924, d. 2001)

American country musician, active from the 1940s to '80s.

Buried at Harpeth Hills Memory Gardens Cemetery in Nashville, TN

Kevyn James Aucoin (b. 1962, d. 2002)

American make-up artist, business founder, photographer and author.

Buried at Holy Mary Mother-God Cemetery in Lafayette, LA

Edith Bouvier Beale (b. 1917, d. 2002)

AKA Little Edie. American socialite, model and cabaret performer, known for her role as subject of the documentary *Grey Gardens* (1975).

Buried at Locust Valley Cemetery in Locust Valley, NY

John Badum (b. 1952, d. 1998)

New York fashion executive, murdered by his former boyfriend and brother-in-law, Hamid Ouhda.

Buried in Rest Haven Cemetery in Woodstock, NY

Chet Baker (b. 1929, d. 1988)

American jazz trumpeter and vocalist, known as "The Prince of Cool".

Buried at Inglewood Park Cemetery in Inglewood, CA

George Balanchine (b. 1904, d. 1983)

Georgian American ballet choreographer known for his signature neoclassical style, co-founded the New York City Ballet.

Buried at Oakland Cemetery in Sag Harbor, NY

James Baldwin (b. 1924, d. 1987)

American writer and prominent activist within the civil rights and gay liberation movements. Best known for his novels *Go Tell It on the Mountain* (1953), *Giovanni's Room* (1956), *The Fire Next Time* (1963) and the essay, *Notes of a Native Son* (1955).

Buried at Ferncliff Cemetery and Mausoleum in Hartsdale, NY

Lucille Ball (Morton) (b.1911, d. 1989)

American actress, comedienne, producer and star of *I Love Lucy*.

Buried at Lake View Cemetery in Jamestown, NY

Frank Baum (b. 1956, d. 1919)

American author of children's books, including *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz* (1900).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Jack Benny (b. 1894, d. 1974)

American comedian popular during the 1930s through the '70s in radio, television, and film.

Buried at Hillside Memorial Park Cemetery in Culver City, CA

Busby Berkeley (b. 1895, d. 1976)

American film director and choreographer, known for the films, *Gold Diggers of 1933* (1933), *Dames* (1934), and *Wonder Bar* (1934).

Buried at Desert Memorial Park in Cathedral City, CA

Milton Berle (b. 1908, d. 2002)

AKA Uncle Mitle or Mr. Television, American actor, comedian, and host of the *Texaco Star Theatre* (1948-1953) one of the first major television stars.

Hillside Memorial Park Cemetery in Culver City, CA

Joe Besser (b. 1907, d. 1988)

American actor, musician, and comedian known for his roles in *The Three Stooges*, *The Abbott and Costello Show*, and *The Joey Bishop Show*.

Forest Lawn Memorial Park Cemetery, in Glendale, CA

Joan Blondell (b. 1906, d. 1979)

American actress known for films including *Footlight Parade* (1933) and *Nightmare Alley* (1947).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Humphrey Bogart (b. 1899, d. 1957)

American actor from The Golden Age of Hollywood, known for his roles in films including *The Maltese Falcon* (1941), *Casablanca* (1942) and *The Big Sleep* (1946).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Ray Bolger (b. 1904, d. 1987)

American actor, dancer, and singer known for his role as the Scarecrow in *The Wizard of Oz* (1939) and Barnaby in *Babes in Toyland* (1961).

Buried at Holy Cross Cemetery in Culver City, CA

Joseph Bonanno (b. 1905, d. 2002)

Italian American mafia boss, formed criminal empires in Brooklyn, NY, California, Arizona and Canada.

Buried at Holy Hope Cemetery in Tucson, AZ

Peter Boyle (b. 1935, d. 2006)

American actor known for his film roles in *Young Frankenstein* (1974), *The Candidate* (1972), *Joe* (1970), and his television role in *Everybody Loves Raymond* (1996-2005).

Buried at Green River Cemetery in Springs, NY

Andrew Breitbart (b. 1969, d. 2012)

American journalist, founder of Breitbart News, and co-founder of HuffPost.

Buried at Hillside Memorial Park Cemetery in Culver City, CA

Les Brown (b. 1912, d. 2001)

AKA Lester Brown, American jazz musician and bandleader to Les Brown and His Band of Renown. Best known for the songs "Sentimental Journey" and "I've Got My Love to Keep Me Warm".

Buried at Westwood Village Memorial Park Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Billie Burke (b. 1884, d. 1970)

American actress known for her role as Glinda the Good Witch of the North in *The Wizard of Oz* (1939).

Buried at Kensico Cemetery in Valhalla, NY

Daniel Hudson Burnham (b. 1846, d. 1912)

American architect and urban designer, part of the Beaux-Arts movement. Designed some of the first skyscrapers in Chicago, New York City, London, San Francisco, and Washington D.C.

Buried at Graceland Cemetery in Chicago, IL

George Burns (b. 1896, d. 1996)

AKA Nathan Birnbaum, American comedian, actor, and singer known for his film roles in *The Big Broadcast* (1932), *A Damsel in Distress* (1927), and *The Sunshine Boys* (1975).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park Cemetery in Glendale, CA

William Seward Burroughs (b. 1914, d. 1997)

American writer, part of the Beat Generation, known for the novels *Junkie* (1953), *Naked Lunch* (1959), and *The Wild Boys* (1971).

Buried at Bellefontaine Cemetery in St. Louis, MO

Maria Callas (b. 1923, d. 1977)

Prolific American Greek soprano opera singer. Died at age 53 from a heart attack.

Ashes were stolen but later recovered and scattered in the Aegean Sea in '79 and partially interred at Père Lachaise Cemetery in Paris, France.

Eddie Cantor (b. 1892, d. 1964)

American comedian, actor, dancer, and singer known for his roles in the films *Whoopee!* (1930) and *Roman Scandals* (1933).

Buried at Hillside Memorial Park Culver City, Los Angeles, CA

Alphonse Capone (b. 1899, d. 1947)

Known as "Al Capone", co-founder and boss of the "Chicago Outfit" mafia, nicknamed Scarface.

Buried at Mount Carmel Catholic Cemetery in Hillside, IL

Truman Capote (b. 1924, d. 1984)

American novelist, screenwriter and playwright, best known for the novella *Breakfast at Tiffany's* (1958) and *In Cold Blood* (1966).

Buried at Pierce Brothers Westwood Village Memorial Park & Mortuary in Los Angeles, CA

Gia M. Carangi (b. 1960, d. 1986)

First American supermodel. Died age 26 from AIDS related complications.

Buried at Sunset Memorial Park in Huntington Valley, PA

Willa Cather (b. 1873, d. 1947)

American writer known for her novels about life on the Great Plains, such as, *O Pioneers!* (1913), *The Song of the Lark* (1915), and *My Ántonia* (1918).

Buried at Old Burying Ground in Jaffrey, NH

Florence Glenda Chapman (b. 1943, d. 1976)

AKA Florence Ballard, American singer and co-founder of the Motown group, The Supremes, suffered from alcoholism and died in poverty age 32.

Buried at Detroit Memorial Park Cemetery in Warren, MI

Anton Chekhov (b.1860, d. 1904)

Russian writer and playwright known for his plays *The Seagull* (1896), *Uncle Vanya* (1898), *Three Sisters* (1900), and *The Cherry Orchard* (1903).

Buried at Novodevichy Cemetery in Moscow, Russia

Samuel Langhorne Clemens (b. 1835, d. 1910)

Pen name Mark Twain, American writer known for his novels *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* (1886) and *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* (1884).

Buried at Woodlawn Cemetery in Elmira, NY

Bonnie Mae Clutter (b. 1914, d. 1959)

Mother of the Clutter family, murdered by Perry Smith and Richard Hickock during a home invasion, died age 45.

Buried at Valley View Cemetery Garden City, Finney County, KS

Herbert W. Clutter (b. 1911, d. 1959)

Father of the Clutter family, murdered by Perry Smith and Richard Hickock during a home invasion, died age 48.

Buried at Valley View Cemetery Garden City, Finney County, KS

Kenyon Clutter (b. 1944, d. 1959)

Son of the Clutter family, murdered by Perry Smith and Richard Hickock during a home invasion, died age 15.

Buried at Valley View Cemetery Garden City, Finney County, KS

Nancy Mae Clutter (b. 1943, d. 1959)

Daughter of the Clutter family, murdered by Perry Smith and Richard Hickock during a home invasion, died age 16.

Buried at Valley View Cemetery Garden City, Finney County, KS

Leonard Cohen (b. 1934, d. 2016)

Canadian singer, poet, and novelist known for his song *Hallelujah* (1984) and books including *The Spice-Box of Earth* (1961) and *Death of a Lady's Man* (1978).

Buried at Shaar Hashomayim Cemetery in Montreal, Quebec, Canada

Natalie Cole (b. 1950, d. 2015)

American Blues singer and actress known for her songs *Inseparable* (1975), *Our Love* (1977), and *Miss You Like Crazy* (1989).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, CA

John Coltrane (b. 1926, d. 1967)

American jazz saxophonist and composer known for records including *Giant Steps* (1960), *My Favorite Things* (1961) and *A Love Supreme* (1964).

Buried at Pinelawn Memorial Park and Arboretum in Wyandanch, NY

Gary Cooper (b. 1901, d. 1961)

American actor, star of both the silent film era and the Golden Age of Hollywood (1930-1948).

Buried at Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary Catholic Cemetery in Southampton, NY

Noel Coward (b. 1899, d. 1973)

English playwright, known for *Woman and Whisky* (1918), *Hay Fever* (1924) and his film, *In Which We Serve* (1942).

Buried at Firefly Estate Grounds Montego Bay, Saint James, Jamaica

Robert E. Crane (b. 1928, d. 1978)

AKA Bob Crane, American actor, radio host, and DJ known for his role as Colonel Robert Hogan in the television series *Hogan's Heroes* (1965-1971). He was bludgeoned to death at age 49 in his hotel room.

Darby Crash (b. 1958, d. 1980)

AKA Jan Paul Beahm, American punk rock vocalist and co-founder of the band The Germs. Died from suicidal heroin overdose age 22.

Joan Crawford (b. 1904-08, d. 1977)

American actress, born Lucille Fay LeSeur, known for films including *Mildred Pierce* (1945), *The Damned Don't Cry* (1950), *Whatever Happened to Baby Jane* (1962).

Buried at Ferncliff Cemetery in Hartsdale, NY

Andrew Cunanan (b. 1969, d. 1997)

American spree killer who murdered five people in the late '90s, including Gianni Versace in Miami and Lee Miglin in Chicago. Died age 27 from suicidal gunshot.

Buried at Holy Cross Cemetery and Mausoleum in San Diego, CA

Jackie Curtis (b. 1947, d. 1985)

American actress, singer and Warhol Superstar.

Buried at Rose Hills Memorial Park in Putnam Valley, NY

Dorothy Jean Dandridge (b.1922, d.1965)

Actress, singer and dancer. First African American woman to be nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actress for her role in *Carmen Jones* (1954).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Ruby Jean Dandridge (b. 1900, d. 1987)

American actress known for role in the radio and TV sitcom the *Amos 'n' Andy* show (1928-1960).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Rodney Dangerfield (b. 1921, d. 2004)

American comedian, actor, screenwriter, and producer known for his role in the films *Caddyshack* (1980), *Easy Money* (1983), and *Back to School* (1986).

Buried at Westwood Village Memorial Park Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Candy Darling (b. 1944, d. 1974)

Transgender actress and Warhol Superstar, known for her roles in Warhol's films including *Flesh* (1968) and *Women in Revolt* (1971).

Buried at Cherry Valley Cemetery in Cherry Valley, NY

Bette Davis (b. 1908, d. 1989)

American actress featured in films including *Jezebel* (1938), *All About Eve* (1950), *Whatever Happened to Baby Jane* (1962), and *Death on the Nile* (1978).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Brad Davis (b. 1949, d. 1991)

American actor known for his roles in *Midnight Express* (1978), *Chariots of Fire* (1981), and *Querelle* (1982).

Miles Davis (b. 1926, d. 1991)

American trumpeter, one of the most influential musicians in jazz history, known for records such as *Kind of Blue* (1959), *In a Silent Way* (1969) and *Bitches Brew* (1970).

Ossie Davis (b. 1917, d. 2005)

American actor, director, writer, and activist known for his roles in the films *Do the Right Thing* (1989), *Bubba Ho-Tep* (2002) and *The Client* (1994).

Buried at Ferncliff Cemetery and Mausoleum in Hartsdale, NY

Sammy Davis Jr. (b. 1925, d. 1990)

American singer, dancer, actor, comedian, and film producer, member of The Rat Pack.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, CA

James B. Dean (b. 1931, d. 1955)

American actor known for his three film roles: *Rebel Without a Cause* (1955), *East of Eden* (1955), and *Giant* (1956). Died in a car crash age 24.

Buried at Park Cemetery in Fairmount, IN

Ruby Dee (b. 1922, d. 2014)

American actress, playwright, screenwriter, and civil rights activist known for her roles in *The Jackie Robinson Story* (1950) and *Do the Right Thing* (1989).

Buried at Ferncliff Cemetery in Hartsdale, NY

Eugène Delacroix (b. 1798, d. 1863)

French painter of the Romantic school, known for *Liberty Leading the People* (1830), *Massacre at Chios* (1824), and *The Death of Sardanapalus* (1827).

Buried at Père Lachaise Cemetery in Paris, France

Cecil B. DeMille (b. 1881, d. 1959)

American actor, director, and film producer. One of the most commercially successful film producers in history. Directed *The Squaw Man* (1914), Hollywood's first feature-length film.

Buried at Hollywood Forever Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Curly- Joe DeRita (b. 1909, d. 1993)

American actor and comedian known for his role as one of The Three Stooges.

Buried at Pierce Brothers Valhalla Memorial Park Cemetery in North Hollywood, CA

Walter Elias Disney (b. 1901, d. 1966)

American animator, film producer and amusement park founder.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, CA

Willy Deville (b. 1950, d. 2009)

American singer and songwriter known for his songs *Storybook Love* (1987), *Love & Emotion* (1981), and *Come a Little Bit Closer* (2004).

Buried at Fairfield Memorial Park in Stamford, CT

DONDI (b. 1961, d. 1998)

Born Donald Joseph White, influential African American graffiti artist popular during the 1970s and '80s, died of AIDS related complications age 37.

Adele Astaire Douglass (b. 1896, d. 1981)

American dancer, stage actress, and singer popular during the 1920s and '30s.

Buried at Oakwood Memorial Park and Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Frederick Douglass (b. 1818, d. 1895)

African American abolitionist, writer and statesman, escaped slavery and became an international leader for anti-slavery.

Buried at Mount Hope Cemetery in Rochester, NY

Ralph Waldo Emerson (b. 1803, d. 1882)

American essayist, poet, philosopher, abolitionist. Led the transcendentalist movement during the mid-19th century.

Buried at Sleepy Hollow Cemetery in Concord, MA

Max Factor (b. 1877, d. 1938)

Polish American beautician, entrepreneur, and founder of the cosmetic company Max Factor & Company.

Buried at Hillside Memorial Park Cemetery in Culver City, CA

William Cuthbert Faulkner (b. 1897, d. 1962)

American writer known for his novels *The Sound of The Fury* (1929), *As I Lay Dying* (1930), and *Light in August* (1932).

Buried at Oxford Memorial Cemetery in Oxford, MS

Frances Farmer (b. 1913, d. 1970)

American actress and hostess of *Frances Farmer Presents* (1958-1964), known for mental health struggles.

Buried at Oaklawn Memorial Gardens in Fishers, IN

Marty Feldman (b. 1934, d. 1982)

British actor and comedian best known for his roles in *The Bed Sitting Room* (1969), *Every Home Should Have One* (1970), and *Young Frankenstein* (1974). Died age 48 from a heart attack.

Larry Fine (b. 1902, d. 1975)

American comedian, actor, and musician known for his role as one of The Three Stooges.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, CA

Ella Jane Fitzgerald (b. 1917, d. 1996)

American Jazz singer known as “The First Lady of Song” and “The Queen of Jazz”, famous for as *Dream a Little Dream of Me* (1950), *Cheek to Cheek* (1956), and *It Don’t Mean a Thing (If it Ain’t Got That Swing)* (1967).

Buried at Inglewood Park Cemetery in Inglewood, CA

Wayland P. Flowers (b. 1939, d. 1988)

American actor, comedian, puppeteer and one of the first openly gay entertainers. Died at age 48 due to AIDS-related complications.

Buried at Cedar Hill Cemetery in Dawson, GA

Abigail Anne Folger (b. 1943, d. 1969)

Heiress to the Folger coffee fortune. One of the five people killed in the Manson Family massacre on Cielo Drive in 1969.

Buried at Holy Cross Cemetery in Colma, CA

Aretha Louise Franklin (b. 1942, d. 2018)

American Soul singer known for her songs *I Never Loved a Man (The Way I Love You)* (1967), *Respect* (1965), and *(You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman* (1967).

Buried at Woodlawn Cemetery in Detroit, MI

Betty Friedan (b. 1921, d. 2006)

Leading activist in the 1960s women's movement, author of *The Feminine Mystique* (1963).

Buried at Sag Harbor Jewish Cemetery in Sag Harbor, NY

Serge Gainsbourg (b. 1928, d. 1991)

French musician, singer, actor, and filmmaker known for songs *Je t'aime... moi non plus* (1967) and *Bonnie and Clyde* (1968), performed as duets with his then-partner Jane Birkin.

Buried at Montparnasse Cemetery in Paris, France

Judy Garland (b. 1922, d. 1969)

American actress, born Frances Ethel Gumm, star of *The Wizard of Oz* (1939), *Meet Me in St. Louis* (1944), and *A Star is Born* (1954).

Buried at Hollywood Forever Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Henry Geldzahler (b. 1935, d. 1994)

Belgian-born American curator of American and Contemporary Art at The Metropolitan Museum of Art. MoMA's first curator of 20th Century Art.

Irwin Allen Ginsberg (b. 1926, d. 1997)

American poet of The Beat Generation, best known for his poem *Howl* (1956).

Buried at Gomel Chesed Cemetery in Newark, NJ

Ronald Lyle Goldman (b. 1968, d. 1994)

Restaurant waiter known as Ron Goldman, murdered with O.J. Simpson's ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson

Buried at Pierce Brothers Valley Oaks Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Eydie Gormé (b. 1928, d. 2013)

American pop and Latin singer known for her songs *Too Close for Comfort* (1956), *Yes My Darling Daughter* (1960), and *Blame it on the Bossa Nova* (1963).

Buried at Hillside Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Philip Guston (b. 1913, d. 1980)

Abstract and Neo-Expressionist artist known for his controversial work dealing with themes of racism, antisemitism, fascism and American identity.

Buried at Artist Cemetery in Woodstock, NY

Anne Gwynne (b. 1918, d. 2003)

American actress known as a "Scream Queen" due to her multiple roles in horror films. Her some of her films include *Black Friday* (1940) and *House of Frankenstein* (1944).

Cremated and ashes scattered at sea, but name included at husband's Max Gilford's grave in Forest Lawn Memorial Park, Los Angeles, CA

Jack Gwynne (b. 1895, d. 1969)

American illusionist and actor known for his movies *Three Hits and a Miss* (1941), *Dark Streets of Cairo* (1940), and *Hello, Sucker* (1941).

Buried at Lakeside Cemetery in Colon, MI

Oliver Hardy (b. 1892, d. 1957)

American comedian and actor known for the comedy duo act Laurel and Hardy. Films include, *The Lucky Dog* (1921), *The Battle of the Century* (1927), and *Another Fine Mess* (1930).

Cremated and interred at the Masonic Garden of Valhalla Memorial Park Cemetery in North Hollywood, CA

Jonathan Harris (b. 1914, d. 2002)

American actor known for his television roles in *The Third Man* (1959-1965) and *Lost in Space* (1965-1968) and voice roles in *A Bug's Life* (1998) and *Toy Story 2* (1999).

Aaliyah Haughton (b. 1979, d. 2001)

American R&B and hip hop singer known for her songs *Try Again* (2000), *Back & Forth* (1994), and *We Need a Resolution* (2001).

Buried at Ferncliff Cemetery in Greenburgh, NY

Edith Head (b. 1897, d. 1981)

American costume designer, winner of eight Academy Awards for Best Costume Design.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Hugh Hefner (b. 1926, d. 2017)

American Magazine publisher and founder of Playboy magazine.

Buried at Westwood Village Memorial Park Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Margot Louise Hemingway (b. 1954, d. 1996)

Model and actress known as Margaux Hemingway, starred in films including *Lipstick* (1976) and *Killer Fish* (1979), granddaughter of writer Ernest Hemmingway. Died from suicide by drug overdose age 42.

Buried at Ketchum Cemetery in Ketchum, ID

Jimi Hendrix (b. 1942, d. 1970)

American singer, guitarist, and songwriter. Known for songs including *Hey Joe* (1967) and *Purple Haze* (1967) and *Voodoo Child* (1968). Died from drug overdose age 27.

Buried at Greenwood Memorial Park & Funeral Home in Renton, WA

Student at Kent State University, shot and killed by Ohio National Guardsmen during a Vietnam War protest.

Lenny Bruce Schneider (b. 1925, d. 1966)

American stand-up comedian, social critic, and satirist known for his 1964 conviction in an obscenity trial, posthumously pardoned in 2003, considered an important figure for freedom of speech.

Buried at Eden Memorial Park Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

William Schroeder (b. 1950, d. 1970)

Student at Kent State University, died at age 19 when shot in the chest by Ohio National Guardsmen during a Vietnam War protest.

Buried at Ridge Hill Memorial Park in Amherst, OH

Jean Seberg (b. 1938, d. 1979)

American actress known for her performance in the films *Saint Joan* (1957), *Breathless* (1960) and *Moment to Moment* (1966). Put on surveillance by the FBI for her support of the Black Panther Party. Died age 40 due to probable suicide.

Buried at Cimetière du Montparnasse in Paris, France

Sidney Sheldon (b. 1917, d. 2007)

American writer for Broadway plays, movies and novels including the film *The Bachelor and the Bobby-Soxer* (1947), the sitcom *I Dream of Jeannie* (1965-70), and the novel *Master of the Game* (1982).

Buried at Westwood Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Dinah Shore (b. 1916, d. 1994)

American singer, actress and host of *The Dinah Shore Show* (1956-1963)

Buried at Hillside Memorial Park in Culver City, CA

Benjamin Siegel (b. 1906, 1947)

AKA Bugsy Siegel, American mobster known for his part in the development of the Las Vegas Strip. Shot dead by a sniper at the age of 41.

Buried at Hollywood Forever Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Phil Silvers (b. 1911, d. 1985)

American comedic actor known as “The King of Chutzpah”, remembered for his roles in films such as *It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World* (1963), *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum* (1966) and the sitcom *The Phil Silvers Show* (1955-59).

Buried at Mount Sinai Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Nicole Brown Simpson (b. 1959, d. 1994)

Ex-wife of former football player, O.J. Simpson, found stabbed to death outside her home along with her friend Ron Goldman.

Buried at Ascension Cemetery in Lake Forest, CA

Francis Albert Sinatra (b. 1915, d. 1998)

Italian American singer and member of “The Rat Pack.” One of the most popular entertainers of the 20th century.

Buried at Desert Memorial Park in Cathedral City, CA

David Alfaro Siqueiros (b. 1896, d. 1974)

Mexican social realist painter and muralist known for *Burial of a Worker* (1923), *Echo of a Scream* (1937), and *La nueva democracia* (1945).

Buried at Panteón Civil de Dolores in Miguel Hidalgo, Mexico

Perry Edward Smith (b. 1928, d. 1965)

One of two men convicted for the murders of the Clutter family, later inspired the novel by Truman Capote, *In Cold Blood* (1966). Died age 36 from execution by hanging.

Buried at Mount Muncie Cemetery in Lansing, KS

Otis Spann (b. 1930, d. 1970)

American blues musician known for *It Must Have Been the Devil* (1954) and playing piano in Chuck Berry's song *You Can't Catch Me* (1956) and Muddy Waters' *Hoochie Coochie Man* (1954).

Buried at Burr Oak Cemetery in Alsip, IL

John Steinbeck (b. 1902, d. 1968)

American writer known for *Of Mice and Men* (1937), *The Grapes of Wrath* (1939) and *East of Eden* (1952).

Buried at Garden of Memories Memorial Park in Salinas, CA

Josef Von Sternberg (b. 1894, d. 1969)

Austrian American filmmaker of both silent and sound films, such as *A Woman of the Sea* (1926), *The Blue Angel* (1930) and *Shanghai Express* (1932),

Buried at Pierce Brothers Westwood Village Memorial Park & Mortuary in Los Angeles, CA

Michael Jerome Stewart (b. 1958, d. 1983)

American graffiti artist beaten to death by police, age 25, his murder led to congressional hearings and public discourse on police brutality against African Americans and Latinx individuals.

Buried at Briar Creek Cemetery in Williamsburg, KY

Lee Strasberg (b. 1901, d. 1982)

Polish American director, co-founder of the Group Theater, considered "the father of method acting".

Buried at Westchester Hills Cemetery in Hastings-on-Hudson, NY

Sharon Tate (b. 1943, d. 1969)

American actress and model, popular during the 1960s. Murdered age 26 by members of the Manson Family cult.

Buried at Holy Cross Catholic Cemetery in Culver City, CA

Francis L. Taylor (b. 1897, d. 1968)

American art dealer and the father of actress Elizabeth Taylor.

Buried at Westwood Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Gilbert Taylor (b. 1914, d. 2013)

British cinematographer known for *A Hard Day's Night* (1964), *The Omen* (1976), and *Star Wars* (1977).

Buried at Isle of Wight Crematorium in Whippingham, England

Sara Taylor (b. 1895, d. 1994)

American actress and mother of Elizabeth Taylor. Starred in the Broadway plays *The Dagger* (1925), *Mama Loves Papa* (1926), and the film *One of the Flames* (1914).

Buried at Westwood Memorial Park in Westwood, CA

Rosetta Atkins Tharpe (b. 1915, d. 1973)

AKA Sister Rosetta Tharpe, American guitarist and gospel singer known for *Rock Me* (1938), *This Train* (1939), and *Down by the Riverside* (1944).

Buried at Northwood Cemetery in Philadelphia, PA

Willie Mae Thornton (b. 1926, d. 1984)

AKA Big Mama Thornton, American blues and R&B singer known for the songs *Hound Dog* (1952), *Ball and Chain* (1968), and *Wade in the Water* (1968).

Buried at Inglewood Park Cemetery in Inglewood, CA

Johnny (Genzale) Thunders (b. 1952, d. 1991)

American guitarist, singer, and songwriter from the 1970s, member of the New York Dolls and the Heartbreakers. Died of a drug overdose, some believe foul play was involved.

Buried at Mount St. Mary Cemetery, Queens, NY

Bobby Troup (b. 1918, d. 1999)

American actor, jazz pianist, and songwriter, known for the song *(Get Yours Kicks on) Route 66* (1946) and his role in television show *Emergency*.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Julie London Troup (b. 1926, d. 2000)

American actress and singer, star of western films and television show *Emergency!* (1972-1979).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Las Angeles, CA

Suzanne Valadon (b. 1865, d. 1938)

French painter and mother of the painter Maurice Utrillo. Known for her paintings *Joy of Life* (1911), *Casting the Net* (1914), and *The Blue Room (La chambre bleue)* (1923).

Buried at Cimetière de Saint-Ouen in Paris, France

Agnès Varda (b. 1928, d. 2018)

Belgian French director, screenwriter, photographer, and artist known for her influence on the French New Wave film movement during the 1950-60s.

Buried at Montparnasse Cemetery in Paris, France

Gore Vidal (b. 1925, d. 2012)

American writer known for his novels *The City and the Pillar* (1948), *Messiah* (1954), and *Julian* (1968).

Buried at Rock Creek Cemetery in Washington D.C.

Natalie Wood Wagner (b. 1938, d. 1981)

American actress known for her roles in *Rebel Without a Cause* (1955), *West Side Story* (1961) and *Splendor in the Grass* (1961). Died age 43 from drowning under suspicious circumstances.

Buried at Pierce Brothers Westwood Village Memorial Park & Mortuary in Los Angeles, CA

Samuel Moore Walton (b. 1918, d. 1992)

American businessman known for founding Walmart and Sam's Club.

Buried at Bentonville Cemetery in Bentonville, AR

Andy Warhol (b. 1928, d. 1987)

American artist, leading figure in the Pop art movement.

Buried at St. John the Baptist Byzantine Catholic Cemetery in Bethel Park, PA

Ethel Waters (b. 1896, d. 1977)

American actress and singer known for the song *Dinah* (1925), the film *Pinky* (1949), and the TV series *Beulah* (1950-53). She was the first African American to star in a leading role of a television show.

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale, CA

Porter Wayne Wagoner (b. 1927, d. 2007)

American country music singer known for *Misery Loves Company* (1961), *Sorrow on the Rocks* (1964), and *Skid Row Joe* (1970). He partnered with Dolly Parton to host the television series *The Porter Wagoner Show* (1960-81).

Buried at the Woodlawn Park Cemetery in Nashville, TN

Thomas John Watson (b. 1874, d. 1956)

American businessman known for starting IBM, Nazi Germany in the 1930s resulting in the company's punch-card machine being used to round up Jewish people.

Buried at Sleepy Hollow Cemetery in Sleepy Hollow, NY

Clifton Webb (b. 1889, d. 1966)

American actor, singer, and dancer, known as Webb Parmelee Hollenbeck, famous for his roles in *Laura* (1944), *The Razor's Edge* (1946), and *Sitting Pretty* (1948).

Buried at Hollywood Forever Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Leonora Carrington (b. 1917, d. 2011)

British Mexican surrealist painter and writer known for her magical-realist paintings and novels *Down Below* (1972), *The Hearing Trumpet* (1974).

Buried at Panteón Inglés in Mexico City, Mexico

Lawrence Welk (b. 1903, d. 1992)

American accordionist, bandleader, and host of *The Lawrence Welk Show* (1951-1982).

Buried at Holy Cross Catholic Cemetery in Culver City, CA

Mary E. Wells (b. 1943, d. 1992)

American Motown singer popular during the 1960s, known for "Bye Bye Baby" (1960), "The One Who Really Loves You" (1962), "My Guy" (1964).

Buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Los Angeles, CA

Eudora Welty (b. 1909, d. 2001)

American writer known for her short story *Death of a Traveling Salesman* (1936), and her novels *Optimist's Daughter* (1972), and *The Robber Bridegroom* (1942).

Buried at Greenwood Cemetery in Jackson, MS

Elie Wiesel (b. 1928, d. 2016)

Jewish Romanian American writer, professor, political activist and survivor of Auschwitz and Buchenwald concentration camps, known for the book *Night* (1956).

Buried at Sharon Gardens Cemetery in Valhalla, NY

Bert Williams (b. 1874, d. 1922)

Bahamian American comedian and actor known for his role in *Darktown Jubilee* (1914) and the first Black man to star in a leading role of a film.

Buried at Woodlawn Cemetery in New York City, NY

Hank Williams (b. 1923, d. 1953)

American musician, singer, and songwriter known for his songs *Honky Tonkin'* (1947), *Move It on Over* (1947), and *Cold, Cold Heart* (1951). Died age 29 from a heart attack due to combination of alcohol, chloral hydrate and morphine.

Buried at Oakwood Annex Cemetery in Montgomery, AL

William G. Wilson (b. 1895, d. 1971)

Co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA), listed as one of The Most Important People of the Century in TIME magazine, 1991.

Buried at East Dorset Cemetery in Dorset, VT

Howlin' Wolf (b. 1910, d. 1976)

Born Chester Arthur Burnett, American blues singer and musician known for *Smokestack Lightnin'* (1956), *Spoonful* (1960), and *Killing Floor* (1964).

Buried at Oakridge Cemetery in Hillside, IL

Holly Woodlawn (b. 1946, d. 2015)

Transgender actress and Warhol Superstar, known for her roles in Warhol's *Flesh* (1968) and *Women in Revolt* (1971).

Buried at Hollywood Forever Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Malcolm X (b. 1925, d. 1965)

African American Muslim minister and civil rights activist. Born Malcolm Little, later known as Malik el-Shabazz. Assassinated in New York City age 39.

Buried Ferncliff Cemetery in Hartsdale, NY

Lester Young (b. 1909, d. 1959)

American jazz tenor saxophonist and clarinetist, known as "The Prez".

Buried at Evergreens Cemetery in New York, NY

Darryl F. Zanuck (b. 1902, d. 1979)

American film producer and studio executive of Twentieth Century Fox, films include *How Green Was My Valley* (1941), *Gentleman's Agreement* (1947), and *All about Eve* (1950).

Buried at Westwood Village Memorial Park and Cemetery in Los Angeles, CA

Florenz Ziegfeld (b. 1867, d. 1932)

American Broadway impresario, organized and financed multiple revues called the *Ziegfeld Follies* (1907-31).

Buried at Kensico Cemetery in Valhalla, NY
